

Frederick P. Rose Hall FACT SHEET

Description Frederick P. Rose Hall, the world's first performing

arts facility designed specifically for jazz performance, education and broadcast, is the home of Jazz at Lincoln Center, one of 11 constituent organizations of Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts. The highly-flexible multi-room facility allows new forms of interaction between the audience and musicians, and creates an experience informed by the unique sound, function and feeling of jazz. Frederick P. Rose Hall also accommodates other art forms, such as opera, dance,

theater and symphony.

Components With 1,100 to 1,233 seats, Rose Theater is designed for

jazz, but also accommodates opera, dance, theater, film, and orchestral performances. The 110-by-43 foot stage (65-by-35 foot proscenium opening) is large enough for full theatrical productions, but with only 95

feet between the stage and the uppermost tier, it maintains a sense of intimacy and involvement between performers and audience. Rose Theater can be used in either a proscenium configuration — suitable for productions such as opera and ballet — or as a concert hall where the audience surrounds the musicians using moveable seating towers, which lend an intimacy and closeness desirable for jazz and smaller ensembles. The 83-foot fly gallery can be closed off when necessary so acoustics can be adjusted.

Rose Theater is also a unique setting for screenings for over 800 guests, providing exceptional clarity of sound for the highest-quality presentation. Equipped with a 35mm film and Christie high-definition digital projector systems, the performance space is one of the world's most versatile performing arts centers an ideal location for movie screenings and events. The ultramodern systems feature a large projection screen measuring 25 feet high by 55 feet wide, with adjustable masking as well as custom designed speaker enclosures from JBL, a Harman Company. The systems feature Dolby® surround sound processing and sourcing from Multi-Format VHS, Multi-Format Betacam, DVD, D-Cinema Server, as well as two 35mm projectors. The systems were donated by Time Warner Inc., a leading media and entertainment company whose businesses include filmed entertainment, interactive services, cable systems, television networks and publishing.

The Appel Room, a 310 to just under 500-seat performance space, provides an elegant and intimate

setting with views through a 50-by-90-foot glass wall overlooking Central Park. Reminiscent of a Greek amphitheater, adjustable risers convert seven levels of theatrical-style seating to four, allowing for cabaret or banquet configurations. The Appel Room is equipped with the Meyer Sound Constellation® acoustic system, an extraordinary breakthrough in acoustical science. Dancing beneath the stars or watching musicians play against the backdrop of the Manhattan skyline are some of the many features.

With views of Central Park and the Manhattan skyline, Dizzy's Club Cocα-Colα, an intimate, 140-seat jazz club, provides a unique space for ensemble performances and educational events. Great Performances, New York's renowned full-service catering and event planning company, is the exclusive caterer for Frederick P. Rose Hall and provides food and beverage service in Dizzy's Club Cocα-Colα. In addition to live music, Dizzy's Club Cocα-Colα serves a full menu of food and beverages. To create a distinctive menu of "down-home flavors with New York flair." Great Performances collaborated with Spoonbread, Inc., New York's largest African-American owned, full-service caterer on recipes, menu and cocktail selections. The menu reflects the diversity of jazz and the regions that epitomize it, and provides a warm and inviting experience for guests in the club, which is named in honor of jazz legend John Birks "Dizzy" Gillespie and made possible by a leadership gift from The Coca-Cola Company. Additionally, Great Performances offers select dishes from Dizzy's Club Cocα-Colα menu as part of the overall facility-catering menu.

The 3,500-square-foot Irene Diamond Education Center contains education, rehearsal and recording studios. The center will offer classes, lessons, films, lectures, and jam sessions, as well as educational opportunities in jazz performance and history in Edward John Noble Foundation Studio, Louis Armstrong Classroom and the Agnes Varis and Karl Leichtman Studio.

The Nesuhi Ertegun Jazz Hall of Fame was designed by the renowned architecture firm Rockwell Group, the space strives to achieve the spirit of improvisation. Design Team: David Rockwell, Diego Gronda, David Wilbourne, Michael Fischer, Evelyn Sherwood, Julie Yurasek, Ira Jones and Kinnaresh Mistry.

The Ertegun Atrium, noted for its welcoming ambiance and sensational views is the largest open space available in Frederick P. Rose Hall, measuring 6,500 sq feet. While its main purpose is to serve as the facility's lobby, the Atrium is also finely suited to hold a comprehensive assortment of events. Recently added to the Atrium are three impressive murals --- reproduced paintings by the legendary African-American artist Romare H. Bearden, entitled Saxophone Improvisation, Midtown Sunset and Show Time.

The **box office** is located at ground level, accessible through the Jazz at Lincoln Center marquee entrance on the corner of Broadway and 60th Street.

Context

The opening of Frederick P. Rose Hall marked the return of jazz to the area where it was first heard in New York City—at Reisenweber's on 8th Avenue and West 58th Street. In 1917, the Original Dixieland Jazz Band from New Orleans performed at this multifaceted venue.

Frederick P. Rose Hall is the cultural centerpiece of Time Warner Center, a 2.8-million- square-foot landmark development at Columbus Circle.

Developed by The Related Companies, L.P., and Apollo Real Estate Advisors, L.P., the Time Warner Center is the largest privately-funded, mixed-use complex in U.S. history. The building was designed by David M. Childs of Skidmore, Owings & Merrill, and the large glass wall that serves as the public face of The Appel Room in Frederick P. Rose Hall, was designed by James Carpenter Design Associates Inc.

Time Warner Center contains the world headquarters of Time Warner; The Shops at Columbus Circle (luxury and specialty retail shops and fine dining); the One Central Park residential condominiums (201 luxury apartments) and Residences at the Mandarin Oriental; the 251-room, five-star Mandarin Oriental Hotel; 211,000 square feet of Class A office space; and a 504-stall valet parking garage.
